



2021 MALAYSIA FLOOD SITUATION REPORT AND EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

Report #6 • Period: 14 – 15 January 2021

Highlights

Today, Sarawak is encountering severe flood situation in certain districts. Nevertheless, Peninsula Malaysia and Sabah are recovering from the flood disaster and evacuees are moving back to their homes safely.

Immediate supports such as adequate food supply, medication, sanitation, and education kits are needed for the affected communities to completely recover.

The Malaysian Civil Defence Force (APM), the Fire and Rescue Department of Malaysia (JPBM), and the National Disaster Management Agency (NADMA) have contributed so much efforts during the flood situation.

- Sarawak** – 4,309 flood victims were moved to 48 evacuation centres in affected areas such as Serian, Samarahan, Miri and Kuching.

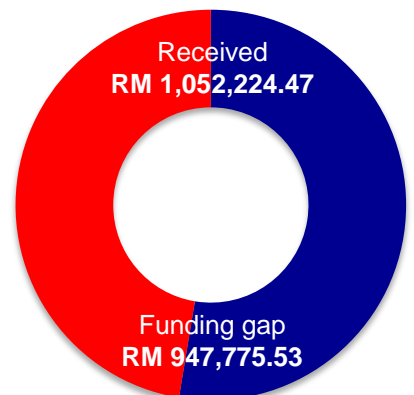

2. **Pahang** - MERCY Malaysia is partnering with APM to distribute 456 hygiene kits to affected areas as follows:

- Chenor
- Temerloh
- Pekan



3. **Kelantan** – Since the flood situation are recovering, majority of the evacuees have moved back to their homes.

4. **Terengganu** – MERCY Malaysia distributed 500 hygiene kits to 12 villages in Hulu Terengganu:

- Kampung Pasir Raja
- Kampung Shukor
- Kampung Kuala Jengai
- Kampung Rantau Panjang
- Kampung Minda
- Kampung Talong
- Kampung Jerangau
- Kampung Lintang
- Kampung Tepus
- Kampung Jongok Batu



5. **Pahang** – Based on the assessment team, Sekolah Kebangsaan Ulu Luit are requesting for school uniforms for their students as part of the back-to-school preparation.

6. **Sabah** – The flood situation in affected areas of Sabah are continuously monitored. Based on the report by Pitas District Officer, the number of evacuees have increased, however they are expected to move back to their homes on 16 January 2021.



Needs overview

Water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH)

Situation have been recovering in the past two days for Peninsula Malaysia and Sabah. However, evacuees are facing difficult situation due to damaged house utilities. Besides, cleaning activities to be conducted to remove all the contaminated water from polluting the housing areas.

Health and COVID-19

Supplies of essential medications and consultation are required for evacuees needs. Besides, face masks and hand sanitizers are required to avoid any COVID disease from contacting.

Food and nutrition

Continuous supply of nutritious food is needed for the evacuees staying in the evacuation centers. This include ready-to-eat-food like biscuits, power bars, and canned food. Not to forget, evacuees who have returned home are in need of nutritious food supply such as rice and oil.

Logistics support

MERCY Malaysia require support to mobilise its teams, which includes medical team (medical officers, medical assistance and nurses), aid distribution team, technical team (for recovery assessments) and cleaning team.

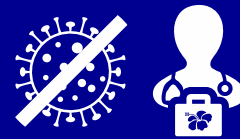
Education support

Not to forget, basic back-to-school items such as school bags, shoes, socks and stationeries are now essentials that are required by children affected by the flood.
